**Re: Request for Investigation – San Francisco Police Department Officers  
Sammie Byrd & Lee Johnson**

Dear Executive Director Henderson,

I have learned that several SFPD officers violated General Orders by racially profiling, illegally detaining & arresting, and using excessive force on and for illegally detaining & arresting and using excessive force on Carlos Espana-Quintanilla. I request that your Department conduct a complete and thorough investigation and recommend appropriate discipline where applicable.

**SFPD OFFICERS ARREST & ESPANA-QUINTANILLA<sup>1</sup>**

*and Espana-Quintanilla Were at a Family Gathering at 1270 Quesada*

Just before midnight on August 30, 2025, Espana-Quintanilla was enjoying a family gathering at his home with his sister Angelica, his stepmom, his close friend and several other friends and relatives.

*A Woman and a Man Fight After Their Car Ran Out of Gas*

About a quarter mile away at the intersection of Ingalls St. and La Salle Ave., a woman was driving a car that unexpectedly ran out of gas. She argued with her boyfriend seated in the passenger seat and at 11:57 PM called the police.<sup>2</sup> Her boyfriend then ran south on Ingalls Street.

Several SFPD officers, including Ofc. Byrd and Johnson, responded to the scene. The woman told officers that her boyfriend ran down Ingalls St. and may be headed to his grandmother's house on Quesada Avenue. The woman described her boyfriend as Black, 5'5" tall, with curly hair, and wearing a black spider hoodie with red rhinestones, black sweats, and crocs.<sup>3</sup> She also told the officers that if he was not wearing the spider hoodie that he would not have a shirt on.<sup>4</sup> Officers Byrd and

Johnson heard the woman's description.<sup>5</sup> They also heard the description broadcast over their radios.<sup>6</sup>

#### *Ofcs. Johnson & Byrd Spot and Chase*

Minutes later at 12:01am on September 1, 2025, Ofcs. Johnson and Byrd returned to their patrol car and drove down Ingalls Street. Ofc. Johnson activated the car's search lights, illuminating the surrounding houses and streets while driving down Ingalls Street.<sup>7</sup> Seconds later, officers spotted walking near the southern side of the intersection at Quesada Avenue. and Ingalls Street. shielded his eyes with his right hand from the car's bright search lights.<sup>8</sup> Officers were mere feet from as they parked their car in the intersection. is 5'2" and wore a brown hoodie with white lettering, and white baggy sweatpants.<sup>9</sup> He is also Black.

Despite the differences between the description and physical appearance, Ofc. Johnson got out of the patrol car, ordered to stop, began to jog across the intersection, and then sprinted after ran to Espana-Quintanilla's house. Ofc. Byrd activated his BWC as he got out of their car; Ofc. Johnson did not.

#### *Officer Johnson Detains*

A large, 10-foot-high metal fence and gate encloses Espana-Quintanilla's residence at 1270 Quesada Avenue. The fence and gate sit approximately 20-30 feet from the sidewalk and behind the residence's driveway. A few feet from the gate, inside the enclosure, is the front door to Espana-Quintanilla's home.

After chasing Ofc. Johnson burst through the gate of the metal fence surrounding the home and grabbed just as he got to the front door of the house.<sup>10</sup> had one hand on the side part of the house to brace himself.

told officers he had done nothing wrong, frantically repeating the phrase "I didn't do anything." Visibly distressed at the chaotic scene unfolding outside their front door, Espana-Quintanilla, his family, and friends began yelling and screaming at officers, demanding to know what officers were doing chasing and detaining when he had just been at the residence. Espana-Quintanilla stepped forward, demanded officers explain their presence, and held onto Mr. shirt, telling Ofc. Johnson to let him go.

*Officer Byrd Repeatedly Grabs Espana-Quintanilla by his Neck*

By this point, Ofc. Johnson was holding one of \_\_\_\_\_ arms and trying to pin him against the side of the house.<sup>11</sup> Ofc. Byrd charged Espana-Quintanilla and repeatedly shoved Espana-Quintanilla to separate him from \_\_\_\_\_. At various points, Ofc. Byrd put both of his hands on Espana-Quintanilla’s neck and shoved him backwards so hard he nearly fell.<sup>12</sup> After Espana-Quintanilla regained his footing, Espana-Quintanilla continued to ask officers why they were there. Ofc. Byrd began repeating, “Back off” to the family members in the room, including Espana-Quintanilla's sister, who is wheelchair-bound and disabled. Espana-Quintanilla then grabbed brown hoodie and began repeating, “That’s my gate! What did he do?”<sup>13</sup>

Confused and visibly in distress, Espana-Quintanilla asked Ofc. Byrd, “What did he do? What did he do?”<sup>14</sup> Espana-Quintanilla’s stepmother echoed him, “Why are you putting your hands on him?” \_\_\_\_\_ repeatedly cried out to officers, “Sir, I’m not doing nothing. You can see me.” He continued, repeating “I didn’t do anything” for nearly 40 seconds.<sup>15</sup> During the commotion, an officer hits Espana-Quintanilla, causing him to respond back, “Why did he hit me? Why did he hit me?”<sup>16</sup> Other family members began questioning officers and seeking answers. At least seven officers were on the scene at this point.

*Ofc. Byrd Slams \_\_\_\_\_ to the Cement*

Within two minutes, other officers arrived at the scene to assist and separate the family from \_\_\_\_\_. Pinned against the wall, \_\_\_\_\_ cried in vain for an explanation, repeating “Sir! Sir! Sir!”<sup>17</sup> Ofc. Byrd then pinned \_\_\_\_\_ head against the side of the house by grabbing the back of \_\_\_\_\_ neck.<sup>18</sup> \_\_\_\_\_ hands were raised above his head on the side of the house, offering no resistance to officers. Other officers held them in place.<sup>19</sup> \_\_\_\_\_ continued to call out, “I didn’t do anything”<sup>20</sup> for nearly one minute. He eventually began to cry.

Other officers began separating those at the residence, including Espana-Quintanilla, from \_\_\_\_\_. Another officer put his right arm around Espana-Quintanilla’s neck for a third time.<sup>21</sup> \_\_\_\_\_ began to cry.<sup>22</sup> With \_\_\_\_\_ pinned against the house and his hands still raised and separated from Espana-Quintanilla, Ofc. Byrd slammed

into the cement while holding one of his hands, preventing [redacted] from bracing himself from the impact of the fall.<sup>23</sup> Ofc. Byrd explained his body-slam as “using his body weight to counter his in a swinging motion” and “placed him on the ground.” He further offered that [redacted] mouth and chin “contacted the cement.” [redacted] continued to cry out in pain as officers placed him in handcuffs.<sup>24</sup> A friend visiting the residence called out to [redacted] “Are you good?!?” [redacted] did not respond, but lay on his side, bleeding, with his pants pulled down to his knees.<sup>25</sup> Another officer took [redacted] who was crying and bleeding from his mouth and nose to a police car. He later received medical treatment because of his injuries.

#### *Ofc. Byrd Returns to Arrest Espana-Quintanilla*

After Mr. [redacted] was secured in the police vehicle, Ofc. Byrd returned to the residence looking for Espana-Quintanilla. He saw Espana-Quintanilla standing outside his residence, near the gate enclosing the front door. Officer Byrd, without saying anything or making any orders to Espana-Quintanilla, sprinted towards him. Espana-Quintanilla ran through the metal gate and closed the gate behind him.

Officer Byrd charged through and pushed the gate open and chased Espana-Quintanilla through the doorway of the residence.<sup>26</sup> He chased Espana-Quintanilla into his bedroom, pushed him onto his bed, held him down, and punched him multiple times in the face.<sup>27</sup> Espana-Quintanilla cried out, “Mom, they’re punching me! Mom, they’re punching me! Mom!” from his position on the bed.<sup>28</sup> His mom cried out, “I know!”<sup>29</sup>

Multiple officers, including Ofcs. Lin (2497), Gaitan-Miller (1251), Johnson (1474), Li (1074), Lin (2497), and Messer (970), ran into 1270 Quesada Avenue and entered Espana-Quintanilla's bedroom. Officer Byrd held Espana-Quintanilla's arms behind his back and rolled him onto the ground from his bed. More than three of the other officers knelt on and put their hands on Espana-Quintanilla, who was lying prone on the ground and crying out for help. Officer Byrd handcuffed Espana-Quintanilla and took him to his police vehicle.

Alarmed at the violent intrusion into their family gathering and at the violence of the officers, Espana-Quintanilla's wheelchair-bound sister, Angelica, began yelling at officers to let her brother go. With one leg, she sat in her wheelchair as officers punched her brother while he yelled for help. Officer Lin stood between Angelica and her brother. Angelica pleaded with Ofc. Lin to let go of her wheelchair and move.<sup>30</sup>

The officers refused to leave. He then pointed his OC pepper spray directly towards Angelica, nearly a foot or so from her face.<sup>31</sup> In his incident report, Ofc. Li claimed that Angelica pushed him in response, causing him to stumble to the ground. Ofc. Lin sprayed her in the face at point blank range with his OC spray while the room was crowded with officers and Espana-Quintanilla's friends and family.<sup>32</sup> The spray dripped down Angelica's face and arms as she continued to yell for the officers to leave the residence.<sup>33</sup>

Espana-Quintanilla and [REDACTED] were taken to the hospital to treat the injuries they suffered by SFPD officers.

#### *The Court Dismisses Charges at the Preliminary Hearing*

Espana-Quintanilla was charged with one felony resisting arrest and felony battery on an officer. At the preliminary hearing the Court dismissed both charges, finding that there was insufficient cause to sustain the charges against Espana-Quintanilla.<sup>34</sup>

### **SFPD OFFICERS VIOLATE DEPARTMENT POLICIES**

#### *Officers Johnson & Byrd Unlawfully Detain and Arrest*

All seizures and searches must be reasonable.<sup>35</sup> Absent a warrant, officers must be able to point to specific, articulable facts that the person is connected to or engaged in criminal activity in order to detain. SFPD policy defines reasonable suspicion to detain as “a set of specific facts that would lead a reasonable person to believe that a crime is, was, or is about to occur and the person under suspicion is reasonably connected to the crime.”<sup>36</sup> Headlong flight from officers, alone, does not provide reasonable suspicion to detain.<sup>37</sup> Conspicuously, SFPD is silent as to what constitutes a “matching description.”<sup>38</sup>

Officers Johnson and Byrd lacked reasonable suspicion to detain [REDACTED] because he did not match the boyfriend's description, which was detailed, specific, and based on a long period of observation. The description Ofcs. Johnson and Byrd heard – in person and on their radios – was that the boyfriend was a Black male, approximately 5'5", wore a black spider hoodie with red rhinestones, black sweats, and crocs.<sup>39</sup> [REDACTED] wore entirely different clothing from the boyfriend and is distinctively shorter at 5'2".

zip-up hoodie was brown not black and did not have a spider nor rhinestones. It had white lettering on it. pants were a completely different color – white as compared to black. The only overlapping characteristic between and the boyfriend is that they are both Black men and happen to be in the same neighborhood. Officers clearly saw clothing through their patrol car’s headlights and search lights, causing to shield his eyes.<sup>40</sup>

Both officers had ample time to reevaluate whether matched the description provided. They did not. Instead, they charged after an individual unconnected to the alleged incident and chased him to 1270 Quesada Ave. Headlong flight from officers is not entirely indicative of wrongdoing, no matter what the subjective beliefs of the officer are. Objective, articulable facts are what matter. The factual differences in the boyfriend’s description and clothing and appearance demonstrate that officers could point to no “specific, articulable facts” that was connected to any criminal activity. He was enjoying spending time with Carlos’ family at their home and was wholly unconnected to the incident officers responded to. even ran to a different location than officers believed he might be going. The response from those at 1270 Quesada Ave. should have alerted officers that they got it wrong. At each turn, both officers ignored every clue that was not the boyfriend and instead acted mechanically. At no point did officers have a legal basis to detain or arrest based on the description provided. Consequently, they violated his constitutional rights and thus SFPD policies.

*Ofc. Byrd Uses Excessive Force on*

General Order 5.01 prohibits officers from using excessive force. Officers have a duty to balance the severity of the offense committed and the level of resistance with the level of force use and its likely injury outcome.<sup>41</sup> Officers must evaluate the use of force based on several factors, including the level of resistance,<sup>42</sup> availability of other feasible, less intrusive force options,<sup>43</sup> and the relative size of the individual compared to the size, physical capabilities, skills, and experience of the officer.<sup>44</sup> Most importantly, officers can only use objectively reasonable force when they are effecting a lawful arrest, detention, or search.<sup>45</sup>

Moreover, Ofc. Byrd violated SFPD policies by slamming head-first into concrete. After officers caught up to he pleaded with officers (“Sir!” “Sir!”), insisted he did nothing wrong (“What did I do?” “I didn’t do nothing!”) and began

crying. Eventually, he raised his arms above his head while being pinned against the side of the house. He stood in that position for nearly two minutes. All the while, [redacted] was surrounded by at least 7 officers who had placed themselves between [redacted] and the occupants of the house. He was, in short, compliant and not physically resisting officers. Despite this, Ofc. Byrd grabbed [redacted] and slammed him face-first into the concrete. Ofc. Byrd towered over [redacted] and significantly outweighed him. [redacted] sustained significant injuries that required medical treatment. He continued to cry out in pain while officers dragged him to their patrol car. This action was egregious, excessive, and particularly violent given [redacted] compliant posture with officers.

#### *Ofcs. Johnson and Byrd Racially Profile*

General Order 5.17 codifies the principles of the Racial & Identity Profiling Act, defining racial profiling as the “consideration of, or reliance on, to any degree, actual or perceived race....in deciding which person to subject to a [pedestrian] stop.”<sup>46</sup> Further, the policy prohibits biased policing, which it defines as when officers “inappropriately consider[] characteristics such as race...”<sup>47</sup>

Here, no specific, articulable facts connect [redacted] to the alleged incident. As discussed above, [redacted] wore entirely different clothing, wore a different hairstyle, and was walking and not running when officers approached him. The only remaining salient characteristic that did “match” was [redacted] race.

Officers could have traveled to the boyfriend’s likely destination but decided not to. Officers could have called in the description to confirm that [redacted] was not the boyfriend based on his clothing. They did not. Instead, officers concluded that any Black man in the area wearing a hoodie would do. The only reason [redacted] was chased was because he was Black man in the area wearing a hoodie.

Because officers’ decision to detain [redacted] was not credibly based on the clothing he wore and was based on his race, Ofcs. Johnson and Byrd violated SFPD policy by detaining [redacted] and ultimately arresting [redacted].

#### *Ofcs. Byrd Illegally Detained, Arrested, and Used Excessive Force on Espada-Quintanilla*

Generally, police cannot enter a home to effect an arrest absent exigent circumstances or an arrest warrant. Officers had no warrant to enter the residence at 1270 Quesada. Similarly, as discussed above, no such exigent circumstances existed here as [redacted] wore entirely different clothing, wore a different hair style, and was shorter than the boyfriend. He was not the person officers were searching for. When police execute an

unlawful arrest, any force the officer uses becomes defacto excessive and triggers the right to self-defense with reasonable force.<sup>48</sup>

Even though [redacted] did not match the boyfriend's description, Ofc. Johnson chased him down Quesada Ave., charged past the metal fence and gate closing the entrance of the house off to the street, and grabbed [redacted] as he attempted to enter the residence at 1270 Quesada. In response, the residents, including Espana-Quintanilla, became upset at the illegal entry and attempted to intervene on [redacted] behalf. Espana-Quintanilla grabbed [redacted] arm and hoodie while [redacted] repeatedly yelled, "I didn't do anything, sir" and "I'm not doing nothing." He was lawfully defending his friend from an illegal detention.

Seeing this, Ofc. Byrd charged headlong into Espana-Quintanilla, pushing him to the ground of his own home. In the process, he put both of his hands around Espana-Quintanilla's neck to push him back not once but twice. Ofc. Byrd's actions were escalatory and only enflamed an already tense situation. Espana-Quintanilla continued to question why police were at his house and asked for officers' names and badge numbers. Ofc. Byrd never reported that he grabbed Espana-Quintanilla by the throat twice.

Once [redacted] was in handcuffs, Ofc. Byrd returned to the residence alone, ignored the demands from Espana-Quintanilla's step-mother for his name and badge number, pushed past Espana-Quintanilla's sister who reached out to Ofc. Byrd, and chased Espana-Quintanilla through the closed metal gate, and into his residence. Ofc. Byrd punched Espana-Quintanilla multiple times. Espana-Quintanilla repeatedly yelled out, "Mom, they're punching me." Ofc. Byrd justified the punches because Espana-Quintanilla had "already been aggressive verbally and physically" but stopped short of saying that Espana-Quintanilla hit him or other officers. In fact, Ofc. Byrd noted in his incident report that he did not sustain injuries to himself.

Ofc. Byrd's immediate aggressive actions towards Espana-Quintanilla were unnecessary and excessive and violates SFPD policies.

#### *Ofcs. Johnson and Byrd Failed to Deescalate*

General Order 5.01 requires officers to use deescalation tactics to "mitigate the need to use a higher level of force and to increase the likelihood of a peaceful resolution."<sup>49</sup> Officers are also required to "build rapport and consider the possible reasons why a subject may be noncompliant."<sup>50</sup>

At each step, both officers escalated the situation. They initially escalated the situation by assuming [redacted] was the boyfriend, chasing him, and pinning him against the wall. Ofc. Byrd escalated the confrontation at the front door by charging into Espana-Quintanilla, repeatedly placing his hands around his Espana-Quintanilla's neck, and for violently pushing [redacted] against the wall. At no point did either officer ever explain why they were there. They had plenty of time to do so. The family and friend gathered there repeatedly demanded to know why they were there. Either officer could have said that [redacted] matched the description of a suspect. Neither did. In fact, no officer provided any information to the family until both [redacted] and Espana-Quintanilla were arrested and taken from the scene.

Because the situation was created entirely because of the officers' actions and because of their failure to deescalate the situation, Ofcs. Byrd and Johnson violated Department policies.

#### *Ofc. Johnson Violates BWC DGO*

General Order 10.11 requires officers to activate their cameras during detentions and foot pursuits<sup>51</sup> because BWCs “demonstrate [SFPD's] commitment to transparency, ensure the accountability of its members, increase the public's trust in officers...”<sup>52</sup> For nearly four minutes, Ofc. Johnson failed to activate his BWC despite ample opportunity to do so when he got out of his patrol car to interact with [redacted] when he chased [redacted] and when he ultimately detained him. Since Ofc. Johnson was the initial member of SFPD who claimed that [redacted] “matched” the description of the boyfriend, his BWC is critically important because it would illustrate clearly how different [redacted] appeared to the description Ofc. Johnson heard multiple times. Ofc. Johnson attempted to explain away his choice not to activate his BWC by saying that it was “inadvertent[.]”

His explanation is without merit and entirely beside the point. He has been employed by SFPD since 2019, has used a BWC camera since then, and has been trained on the applicable policies. The policy creates no exception for “inadvertently” failing to activate a BWC when an officer is required to do so. For good reason: a defendant's constitutional rights to all discovery evidence is undermined when officers can ignore department policies and fail to activate their cameras at their own discretion. His blatant violation of SFPD policy corroborates his shoddy investigative work misidentifying [redacted] as the boyfriend despite their obvious differences in clothing, appearance, and height.

Ofc. Johnson's violation of Department policies is clear and is precisely the type of problem the policy was meant to address in the first place.
